The junior team comprising of Andrew Clifford, Oli Scarff and Gareth Edwards also managed to win their category with a wining time of 10hrs 23 mins.

Congratulations also go to Dan Wright who, having led one of the year ten teams through the 18 mile course, then carried on to complete the 38 mile course in one of the fastest solo times, 11hrs 51mins. Congratulations to them all and good luck next year. Well Done!




Mr Henderson Memorial.


With the building of the new section on the school it was decided that there would be a memorial to Mr Henderson in the new Landscaped Quad.
