This is the Institute's flagship event attracting over 2500 of the UK's top directors. The topic this year was globalisation and its impact. The subject matter not only attracted the protesters but also speakers of world renown including Mary Robinson, United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights and former President of Ireland, Henry Kissinger, Nobel Peace Laureate and former US secretary of State as well as captains of industry such as the Chairman of Unilever UK and the Chairman of Shell UK. The students made the most of hearing such prestigious speakers and hopefully added considerable breadth to their business and economics subject knowledge. (MJB)
