

SIR THOMAS RICH'S NEWSLETTER

FEBRUARY 2003



For several years the School has celebrated its foundation by holding a Founder's Day Service, recently at Holy Trinity Church in Longlevens. I have felt that this has not done justice to the history and traditions of Sir Thomas Rich's in which we take great pride. This year I wish to alter the format so that pupils are more actively involved. As well as talking about the school's history in assemblies and displaying archive material I intend to hold a "Founder's Week" when (i) our Year 7 pupils will visit St. John's Northgate, the Guildhall and The Old School House to learn of their significance in our history (the latter two were the sites of the school prior to moving to Longlevens); (ii) asking pupils to stage events which will raise money to fund the education of 20 poor pupils, emulating Sir Thomas Rich's aims when he founded the "Blew Coat Hospitall". The beneficiaries will be pupils at our link school in Uganda who would otherwise not be able to afford to go to school.

OXFORD & CAMBRIDGE UNIVERSITIES

Our Upper Sixth students have completed their university applications and are now receiving offers, Oxford and Cambridge Universities send out their offers first, following interviews at the colleges in December, I am delighted to report that eight of our students have been offered places, conditional upon them achieving top Alevel grades. Well done to all eight, this is the highest number of Oxbridge offers we have had. James Hodge (to read chemistry) and Akshay Nair (medicine) received open offers from Oxford: Tarig Piperdy (chemistry) has an offer from St. College. Oxford: Michael Smith Peter's (engineering, economics and management), Wadham College, Oxford: Tim Grant (engineering), Churchill College, Cambridge; Darrell Woods (economics), Fitzwilliam College, Cambridge; Michael Foxcroft (engineering), Clare Cambridge: Richard Parker College. (engineering), Emmanuel College, Cambridge.

DUKE OF EDINBURGH REPORT

Training is now well under way for the 37 new Bronze participants this year. They have already been taught about the Country Code, Navigation and Route Planning by Mr. Dempsey, Mr. Gowler, Miss Lucas and Mr. Crewe. Further sessions on Safety, Weather, Campcraft and Food take place after half term.

Many participants have already started activities, which will be counted towards the Skill, Physical Activity or Service part of the award. Thank you to anyone who has agreed to act as an assessor for these activities. On 8th March participants will get their first practical exercise, which is a two-hour Orienteering activity in the Forest of Dean. Boys will be looking to get sponsored for this event and this is the main source of the unit's funding for equipment. DD

On 11th January the school entered a team into the Under 16 Carlton Top Schools Badminton tournament, playing in the regional finals at Archway sports centre in Stroud. The school competed against very strong opposition from schools all over the South West, enduring nearly six hours of badminton. The highlight of the day's play was a closely fought contest against the Cotswold School, which saw all players winning in their singles and doubles contests. DS

HOUSE EVENTS

At the end of last term the first of the House competitions were completed. Almost 300 entries were received for House **Art**, with Westgate winning from Northgate, Southgate and Eastgate. The House **Junior Rugby** competitions were close, Eastgate and Southgate tying as joint Year 8 winners, Westgate won in Y9 and Northgate in Y10 – overall Westgate and Northgate were equal, ahead of Eastgate and Southgate who also tied. Northgate won the **Senior Rugby** from E, S, W.

The House rugby cups were presented in the final assembly of last term by Clive Stuart-Smith and Kevin Howie. We were pleased to welcome Clive and Kevin back to school, both are expupils. Kevin is now Gloucester Rugby Club's Community Development Manager, Clive is a member of their playing squad, he captained England Under 18s when he was at school and progressed to captaining their Under 19 team last year.

This term further House events have been completed. Junior and Senior General Knowledge Quizzes were held last month, Northgate won the former and Westgate the latter, overall Northgate won from S, W and E. The House Music competition comprised junior solo, junior ensemble, senior solo, senior ensemble and open events; all were keenly contested with performances ranging from a Vivaldi cello concerto to 'Purple Haze' by Jimi Hendrix. The adjudicator was Mr. Whittle, one of our peripatetic instrumental teachers. The final result was Westgate ahead of E, S and N. The House Junior Swimming Gala was won by Westgate from N, E and S, and the Senior Gala saw a victory for Eastgate ahead of N and W.

These results mean that, after seven House events, overall Westgate are leading with $28^{1}/_{2}$ points from Northgate $(25^{1}/_{2})$, Eastgate $(19^{1}/_{2})$ and Southgate $(15^{1}/_{2})$. There are a further twelve competitions remaining. We are grateful to the staff who organise and run the events and to the House captains who organise the teams. The House competitions provide important extra-curricular opportunities for large numbers of pupils.

GLOBAL ACTION

The Christmas card recycling went well and we took two large boxes of cards to the Cobalt Unit at Cheltenham General Hospital.

We are still collecting: stamps for Guide Dogs for the Blind; mobile phones & printer and toner cartridges for Winston's Wish.

The Global Action Team assisted by 7R was back in action this term doing a second audit of the School's waste. We have been recycling paper since September so we hoped for a significant reduction in our waste. The initial results show an overall reduction of 17,000g, approximately 25% of last year's total. This is due to paper being recycled but there is an increase in organic waste and waste due to crisp packets, plastic bottles and other lunch packaging. If we could find a way to reduce the packaging brought into school this would further cut the amount of waste sent to landfill sites.

All landfill sites in Gloucestershire will be full up in the next seven years. Incineration of rubbish would cost every household \pounds 1,000 per year. Thank you for supporting the recycling scheme, which reduces this problem just a tiny bit. We all have better things to do with £1,000.

Remember REDUCE, RE-USE and RECYCLE.
