The highlight of this half-term has been our Founder's Week, held last week. It is always impressive that so many pupils and staff willingly take part and help to raise funds for our 20 sponsored girls. It seems a fitting way to mark our School's foundation that we attempt to enter into the spirit of Sir Thomas Rich's generosity, compassion and belief in education as a fundamental means of betterment for individuals and society. I am proud that our pupils, who benefit from such excellent educational opportunities, allow 20 girls to similarly raise their aspirations.

FOUNDERS' WEEK

Last week saw our attempts to raise over £4,000 to sponsor 20 girls at PMM School, Uganda, to emulate Sir Thomas Rich's foundation of our School by bequeathing funds for the education of 20 poor boys. I am grateful to all those individuals, groups and Forms who organised events and to all who contributed.

Events included: cake sale (8S), penalty shoot-out (10S), Teachers' Rap Battle (10T), Battle of the Bands (L6G), darts (U6T), costume day (7R), sponsored dyed hair (Callum Bird), swimming (Will Middleton), silence (Kingston Myles), sweets quiz (8R), skateboarding (Y7), Grenadier Guards rifle range, No Homework Day and next term's two Free Dress Days.

PMM School has informed us of the exam results of the girls who took their 'O' and 'A' levels last year. Seven girls were in S4, the equivalent of our Year Eleven, all took 'O' levels at the end of their school year in December. Two have progressed into PMM's Sixth Form and three have moved to other schools or colleges. Two girls were in S6, their U6th, each passed three or four 'A' levels and have thus qualified for entry into higher education. It is heartening to know that our sponsorship has helped these girls to fulfil their potential.

Phil Hanson is currently at PMM School, during his GAP year. He left our Upper Sixth last year and will start at university this October. We hope that he will be the first of many Richians who spend time during GAP years at PMM School. Miss Preen will be visiting PMM School in July as part of our teacher exchange, we hope to welcome a PMM teacher next term.

iPODS

The School Rules state that: your son/daughter should not bring into school electrical equipment other than a calculator. This includes iPods, MP3 players, CD-players and suchlike.

The principle is that pupils attend school to work, not to listen to entertainment – and such items are small, expensive and desirable which can lead to problems of damage or loss which then take up disproportionate amounts of senior staff time.

STUDENTS' SURVEY

We undertook a parents' survey last April, which confirmed support for and satisfaction with all aspects of Sir Thomas Rich's. The free response comments were also helpful – as a result we now have appointment systems for parents' evenings, we are reviewing our assessment and marking procedures and the provision of healthy food in the canteen has made further progress (see page 13 of this NewsREEL). Having found that process helpful, last week we undertook a survey of students' views. The completed questionnaires have now been sent to the same company which produced our parents' survey report.

Nine members of our Lower Sixth formed a committee to take part in a debating competition at St Hugh's college, Oxford University. This was a regional heat with the prize being the opportunity to participate in the National forum over three days in Durham in September. The task set was challenging. A range of five motions had to be researched, main speakers found and teamwork developed. The group showed admirable ambition, working together with only limited support and travelled to Oxford well prepared. They performed admirably. Speakers used notes rather than read and argued fluently. The whole team participated with all taking turns to speak from the floor, supported by notes and ideas conceived in response to arguments raised by other teams. We were delighted to find that we were one of two Schools to qualify for the regional final a month later.

We returned on 17th March, having undertaken further bouts of independent research. Abinadon school were worthy winners but

the standard of debating from Rich's and the other two schools was high. This was an exciting, stimulating opportunity for our students which they grasped fully. It has also offered them a valuable insight into the European Union and its priorities, not to mention the atmosphere of an Oxbridge college.

SIXTH FORM VISIT TO WATCH THE GERMAN PLAY AT BRISTOL UNIVERSITY

"The bad boys in school!"

This Austrian Play, written by Johann Nestroy in 1847 and set in Vienna, showed that misbehaviour is not a modern phenomenon. Boys will be boys or so the saying goes. The play was performed with obvious enjoyment and panache by students of the German department at Bristol University. It was an excellent opportunity for our sixth formers to see this piece of drama. However, their roles were not simply restricted to that of appreciative spectators for they were to provide the modern interludes and perhaps an answer to the question: Has behaviour in schools changed since 1847?

The Lower Sixth wrote and performed a short sketch which outlined all too clearly the boredom from which pupils can suffer at the hands of a boring teacher. The sketch depicts the escalation from boredom through misbehaviour to desperation. Excellent performances were given by all.

GCSE ART TRIP TO THE PITT RIVERS MUSEUM

CATERING

You may have read of the Government's White Paper on school food. Our catering company, Alliance in Partnership, has already adopted the proposed nine food-based standards and will be fully compliant next term. These are: confectionary and savoury snacks will no longer be available: not more than two deep fried products per week; no processed foods; at least two portions of fruit and vegetable per day, at least one being fruit; easy access to drinking water: selection of breads available: oily fish served at least once every three weeks; highly salted condiments and salt not available; the only drinks on offer to be water, skimmed or semiskimmed milk, fruit juice, yoghurts and smoothies.

There are a further fourteen nutrient standards proposed by the Government – our caterers will meet these standards by September this year. Alliance in Partnership is planning to provide web-based information to enable easy access to nutritional make-up of meals, forthcoming menus and, in due course, cashless payment systems.



Changes to Criteria for FREE SCHOOL MEALS

As from April 6th, 2006 there will be a change to the income 'threshold', which forms part of the Child Tax Credit free school meals eligibility category. The new threshold figure will be £14,155,00.

There is also an additional benefit that will give parents entitlement

to free school meals for their children (see below).

From April 6th, 2006, children whose parents/guardians receive the

From April 6th, 2006, children whose parents/guardians receive the following support payments are entitled to receive free school meals:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseekers Allowance
- Support under part VI of the Immigration & Asylum Act 1999
- Child Tax Credit provided they are entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual income, as assessed by Her Majesty's Revenue & Customs, that does not exceed £14,155.00.
- The Guarantee element of State Pension Credit.

IMPORTANT - If any amount of Working Tax Credit is received, regardless of whether the annual income is below £14,155, the child will not be entitled to claim Free School Meals.

Students who receive Income Support or Income-based Jobseekers Allowance in their own right and attend a Sixth Form school are also entitled and will need to submit a claim themselves.

V BOURNSIDE
