LOCKER KEY DEPOSITS CHANGE OF PROCEDURE

In an attempt to save the annual disruption of taking locker key deposits in September and returning them in July each year it has been decided to change the procedure. Each September the incoming Y7 students will be asked to pay £5 as a deposit on their locker key. This deposit and the entitlement to a locker will carry forward for 5 years until they are leaving Y11. For students staying on in the L6th the current procedure will remain, i.e. they will be issued with a locker in the 6th Form bank of lockers and retain this locker for the whole of their 6th Form period.

In the event that:

- a student changes form rooms and no longer has access to his original locker his key will be collected from him in July and a new key issued at no additional cost in the following September.
- a student leaves the school before Y11 or U6th the deposit will of course be refunded on production of the original key.

HISTORY PRIZE


James Fleming, currently studying at Sheffield University has recently been notified that he has won first prize in an essay competition organised by the Richard III Society. His essay entitled, "To what extent is the Shakespearean portrayal of Richard the Third distorted?" was written last year as his A-level coursework assignment. Unfortunately, James was in the middle of his exams and was unable to go to London to collect his prize from The Duke of Gloucester. Happily, Mr J Reid, who was James' coursework mentor, was able to receive the prize (£100 and a book to both James and the school) on James' behalf.

The citation for the prize read, "James's essay discusses whether Shakespeare's portrait of Richard was distorted. It is well constructed with a mature treatment of sources, such as diaries. He produces a good narrative on the Princes but goes off at a tangent a little to justify Richard's actions towards Earl Rivers, Lord Hastings and the Duke of Buckinghamshire. Overall this is an excellent and thorough essay".

All students in the U6th History sets have to write an extended essay on an historical debate of their choice – four of the best from this year's groups have also been entered for a prize. This year the Julia Wood prize as offered by St Hugh's College, Oxford. James' essay is posted on the School website at http://www.schoolportal.co.uk/GroupHomepage.asp?GroupID=40877




v Dean Close School
