# NewsREEL





We welcome our new students and staff as we embark upon a new school year. This term is the longest and by far the most important. Almost fifteen weeks of uninterrupted work take us through to Christmas – so it is essential that students start as they mean to carry on. High aspirations, good organisation and hard work will ensure firm foundations for ultimate success. We recognise and appreciate the support of parents in ensuring good attendance, punctuality, smart appearance and the provision of space and time for homeworks.

## New Pupils

We have one hundred and fourteen boys in Y7 who join us from fifty-eight different primary schools. The new L6th has one hundred and twenty-seven students of whom fifty-one join us from other secondary schools. Thirty-nine of the L6th are girls, giving us a total of seventy-seven girls in our 6th Form of two hundred and fifty eight students. Total pupil numbers are eight hundred and twenty-two (compared with eight hundred and twenty in September 2006).





### We are delighted to welcome to our staff:

**Mr. Morgan**, Deputy Headmaster, who joins us from the Royal Latin School, Buckingham. Mr. Morgan teaches Geography and R.E.. He has responsibility for KS3 (Mr. Carter has moved to KS4).

Mrs. Hanson, teaching German, joins us from Blenheim School, Epsom, Surrey.

Just before the summer holidays started we were pleased to welcome **Mr. Young** as our new Site Manager.

## Supervised Homework

We are organising 'supervised homework' after school, from 3:30 to 4:30 pm., every day in the library. This is available for all pupils who may wish to use the facility together with pupils who have difficulty completing homeworks. If a pupil fails to do a homework his/her teacher may instruct them to complete it under supervision – the pupil will be issued with a written reminder so that parents have a day's notice.

Homework is a vital part of the education we provide. Pupils whose effort in homework is weak invariably under-perform in examinations. Hence our staff are giving up their time to provide this additional support for pupils who are unable to complete homeworks satisfactorily. I hope that parents will understand and support us if their son is required to attend.



Every summer is a busy time at school for maintenance and development of our learning environment. The main task this summer was refurbishment of the toilets – they had become rather dated but are now much brighter and modern in appearance. We have a rolling programme of laboratory up-grading, it was the turn of one of the Biology Labs to be renovated in the holidays. An additional storage block has been built onto the Sports Hall. The aged cycle racks and shelters have been replaced by a new purpose-built structure. Interactive whiteboards are a boon to teaching, they have now been installed in most rooms.

Classics students will be giving a performance of Antigone' on Monday, 15 October in the school hall from 7:30 pm. This is a modern version of Sophocle's powerful tragedy. Tickets are available for £2.50. Call reception desk for availability.

# Australia Rugby Tour 2007

The U17 Rugby Tour of Queensland and New South Wales was a great success both on and off the field.

The 1st team were outstanding and went through the Tour unbeaten, winning all four of their matches including a hard fought victory by 8 - 5 against a strong Sydney District side.

The 2nds also played extremely well and won three of their four matches. Their only defeat was against a powerful 1st XV from Hunter Valley Grammar School. In total an impressive two-hundred and two points were scored and just fifty-six conceded.



On the first day the students made aliens from green slime, built scale models of living quarters that could be used for survival on Mars and designed badges to celebrate the Mission. It was all great fun and the aliens proved to be most popular. The best badge designs were rewarded with a mug bearing the design, and there were prizes for the best

alien and the best building.

On the second day the students undertook three challenges. They made rockets (a repeat of last year's successful and very popular activity), with a prize for the one that travelled the furthest. They made landers to

### Examinations

### GCSE

The one hundred and eleven boys in Y11 achieved a pass rate of 94.5%, the average number of passes at grade C+ was 9.45 per pupil. 53.5% of all entries grained grades A and A\*. 68 boys each gained five or more passes at A and A\*; twelve boys each gained eleven passes all at A and A\*. The overall points score (based on A\*=58, A=52, B=46, etc.) was four hundred and eighty-eight, equivalent to over nine grade A passes per pupil.

The thirty Y10 boys who took their Mathematics GCSE a year early all passed at grades A/A\*. The R.S. GCSE short-course examination, also taken at the end of Y10, had a 100% pass rate, 60% at grades A/A\*.

Thirteen Y9 boys took GCSE Geology following a year of lessons held by Mr. Green and Mr. Carter during lunch breaks – all passed at grade B and above.

### 'AS' Level

Our one hundred and thirty-two L6th students achieved a pass rate of 96.9% in their 'AS' examinations, 59% at grades A and B. Three quarters of the Year each achieved at least one grade A, almost half gained two or more grade As including nine students who each gained four A grades.

#### 'A' Level

We had one hundred and nineteen students in our U6th, their pass rate was 99.7% with 61.9% at grades A and B. The average number of passes per student was 3.8. The average UCAS points score per candidate (based on grade A=120, B=100, C=80....) was 396.3, equivalent to two As and two Cs per student.

# Göttingen Exchange 2007

Our return visit to Göttingen took place in July, just before the beginning of the summer holidays. Twenty boys from Y10 and 20 girls from the High school travelled to Göttingen, Germany to stay with their exchange partners and their families. Our pupils enjoyed the warm welcome and some hot weather. The official programme included exciting excursions to the zoo and city of Hannover on one day, whilst another day was put aside for visiting the centre of Berlin, including the recently-restored Parliament building, the "Reichstag". Our pupils occupied their free time with their partners in such pursuits as going to the cinema, shopping and swimming in the open

air pool. The success of the trip was clear by how sad everyone was to leave, although some have already made plans to return to Göttingen.

Here are some extracts from the pupils' diaries:

"The family was very generous with the food they gave me. German food is very different from what we eat in England; I think it is unhealthier. But the Currywurst is yummy."

"Our trip to Berlin was great. First we went to the *Reichstag* and we had to queue for hours to get in, but the view from the dome on the roof of the building was fantastic and the toilets were very somewhat original!"

## Arts Experience 2007

This year's Arts Experience was originally intended to be based on African culture, but as this replicated a topic we had covered in recent years, we decided to broaden the theme to include 'Folk Culture from around the World'. This allowed us to include a wide range of activities, including carnival figures, Maori dances and Russian folk songs, amongst other items.

The aim of the whole event is to give all Y8 pupils the opportunity to take part in a collaborative arts activity over a period of three days. With this in mind, normal timetable is suspended and each pupil chooses an arts specialism on which to concentrate. This can include Dance, Drama, Music, Film or Visual Art.

The first two days are spent instigating and practising a piece which is then put into a run-

through in the hall on the third morning, prior to a presentation to other pupils and families on the final afternoon.

As the pupils can spend an extended time on their chosen activity, they are able to study it in much further depth than would normally be possible. It also allows for continuous progression, so the work can be evaluated and refined through practice, engendering deeper understanding. Pupils were also encouraged to put in their own ideas, rather than being led entirely by supervising staff. This resulted in a more personal approach to each piece.

The whole event was enjoyed by all pupils and created a memorable culmination to the summer term.

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# Y9/10 Spanish Trip to Ribadesella



At 6:45 in the morning of July 8th, thirty eager pupils and the three tired teachers (Mr Hearn, Miss Brake and Mr Parker) arrived at school. We loaded our suitcases onto the coach and left at 7:00 for

Stansted Airport for the flight to Asturias.

The only hitch at the airport was the security check. Five of us (Jim Bell, Andy Marshall, Jack Hollocks, Karl Turner and I) were detained for carrying too much liquid in our hand luggage – over 100ml! I had my sun cream and hand wash confiscated! Following that, we were given free time to browse the shops and grab a bite to eat. Following a very comfortable 'EasyJet' flight and coach journey, we arrived at Hotel Marina. This was the only occasion when it rained. After tea, we had a brief tour of the town which was very interesting and Mr Hearn gave us our diaries which had to be completed in Spanish.



Monday - we had all day in Ribadesella to explore surroundings in greater detail and have fun on the beach. Also, we were allowed to 'swim' in the sea – this was enjoyable but the taste of

salt water made me feel slightly uncomfortable!

Tuesday - after breakfast, we departed at 10:00 by coach to visit the famous 'Picos de Europa' mountains – Spain is the second most mountainous country in Europe. We all went on a

challenging walk. After a while, we split into two groups. The more determined carried on and walked for a longer time. However, a fair amount of people chose to go on the shorter walk because they were tired or too hot. For me, the main

attraction of the shorter walk was that there was a nice café at the end – a well deserved treat for all my efforts!



Wednesday - market day, so the town was busy. In the morning, we visited the 'Tito Bustillo' caves where we saw some very ancient cave paintings: approximately 15,000 years old.

After lunch, the sand sculpture competition took place. Unfortunately, our group came close to last, despite all our hard work. We had plenty of free time left to spend playing on the beach and to 'swim' in the sea. The vicious waves caused pain on my sunburnt back!



Thursday - in Oviedo, the capital of Asturias. In the morning, we had a town trail and the afternoon was free for sight seeing or shopping. The people who thought of their parents

kindly bought them a gift. This day was the hottest—temperatures reached up to 35°!



Friday - we were driven upstream to Arriondas. We then canoed in pairs for approximately 15km downstream through the beautiful scenery. The provided lunch was not quite my cup of tea!

Playing football with Spanish teenagers on most of the evenings gave us a great opportunity to mix with locals and try conversing in Spanish. We were all given the task of interviewing a person in Spanish about their life and occupation. I chose to interview one of the main assistants of the Hotel Marina. It went well as I was able to understand almost all of what she said.



Saturday - having packed everything away, we could buy any last minute presents from the shops in Ribadesella. Then at 10:30, we headed for Gijón to visit an aquarium.

This was fascinating. We then went to the Asturias airport to catch the flight back to Stansted. Our plane was delayed by half-an-hour. This put many angry expressions on people's faces, but we managed to arrive back at school as expected. We stopped at Oxford service station for tea, and then returned to STRS at 8:40pm This trip was brilliant and well organised; plenty of interesting activities. ## PA Fund Raising

We thought it might interest you to know that, in the last five years, the PA has raised and given £169,000 to the school,

which averages £34,000 per year. This money has been spent on a variety of things, including grants for affiliation fees to a range of organisations, such as Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust, The Royal Geographical Society, English School's Rugby Football Union and the British Chess Federation, the running costs of the 2 school mini-buses, subscriptions for magazines for the school library, in 2002 we paid for a new mini-bus (although I should add, that we paid for the old one as well). We have given a significant grant



to enable the school to improve its computer provision and purchased 4 x 2 decimal place Balances, which connect to the computers. We have purchased 2 x Techsoft Laser Cutters (Cam A2) for the CADCAM department and we funded the total re-development cost of the sports changing rooms (just over £25,000). In the 2006/07 academic year we were asked to make a contribution towards additional interactive whiteboards and PC's - the total cost of which is £32,766. We are currently waiting to see whether there is enough money in the kitty to pay the total cost. We have only managed to achieve all of this with the hard work of the PA and the support of you, the parents.
