This is an important term, when good work routines are established and high standards are set. It is also the longest term, over fourteen weeks of uninterrupted teaching, so a significant proportion of the year's work is covered. I wish all our students an enjoyable and successful year.

We wish all an enjoyable start to their Rich's careers. Also to those teachers who have taken on new responsibilities this year, for example as Heads of Department or Heads of Year. I am delighted that we have a full teaching complement of subject experts. I believe that any school is as good as its teachers, we are fortunate to have a fine staff who are hard-working and committed.

NEW PUPILS

We have one hundred and six boys in Y7 who join us from sixty different primary schools. The new Lower Sixth has one hundred and twenty six students of whom thirty six join us from other secondary schools. 26 of the Lower Sixth are girls, giving us a total of 65 girls in our Sixth Form of two hundred and forty six students. Total pupil numbers are seven hundred and ninety five (compared with eight hundred and twenty two in September 2007).

EXAMINATION RESULTS

We were delighted that our students achieved excellent examination results this summer.

The details are as follows:

GCSE

This was our best ever set of GCSE results so well done to last year's Y11 students. The average points score per candidate (based on A*=58, A=52, B=46, etc.) was 517 which equates to an average of ten A grades per student. The average number of GCSEs passed per student was 10.35. 100% of our students gained at least 5 passes at grade C and above, indeed every student passed at least seven GCSEs at that level. 80 of the 116 boys in Y11 each gained at least five passes at grades A and A*, eighteen boys each gained at least ten A and A* passes each.

The boys who took their Mathematics GCSE at the end of Y10 all passed, 24 at grade A* and five at grade A. Well done to the Y9 boys who took their Geology GCSE examination, following study at lunchtimes through the year – five achieved A*, two grade A and three grade B.

AS

In the AS exams, taken at the end of the Lower Sixth, the pass rate was over 97%, the commonest grade was grade A, two thirds of the Year group gained at least one A grade, twenty one students gained three or more A grades each.

A-Level

At A-level too we recorded our highest ever results, from a really good Year group. There was 100% pass rate, 74% of all results were grades A and B, indeed the average points score was equivalent to three A grades, plus General Studies, for each student. There were 129 students in the Upper Sixth of whom 84 each achieved at least one grade A, 20 students each gained three or more grade As.



END OF TERM

Some events at the very end of last term were too late for inclusion in the last NewsREEL. The final House competitions were completed: Westgate won the cricket and Northgate won at tennis. Thus, after 21 inter-House competitions through the year, the Cock House Trophy was retained by Westgate. The final totals were: Westgate 72½ points, Southgate 68, Northgate 55½, Eastgate 53 (based on 4, 3, 2, 1 points per competition; double points for art, music, drama, athletics.)

We were delighted to welcome Vikram Banerjee from Gloucestershire County Cricket Club to our final assembly of term to present the colours, certificates and cups. We thank Vikram and Gloucestershire CCC for their support.

Sixth Form China Trip July 2008

The school year was drawing to an end, examinations were completed and the allure of the East beckened – China. No gold medals to be won on this occasion but it was the opportunity of a lifetime for the STRS team, the opportunity to see this enigmatic country, to gain a flavour of its language and culture. We were the quests of a prestigious language school in Suzhou, situated in East China. Described by Marco Polo as the Venice of the East it was at first glance perhaps difficult to find its charm amid the skyscrapers and blocks of flats. On further acquaintance, however, a wealth of treasures was to be discovered. A network of canals traversed the town meandering amongst old houses and casting a romantic spell. The gardens in Suzhou impressed in equal measure. Beautifully constructed, they constantly delighted as one strolled from one area to another. Suzhou is also renowned for its silk and it was interesting to visit the factory to observe how silk is produced. Trips to Tiger Hill and the water town of Tongli allowed us to further glimpse into their past and into their world.

Shanghai, a city of some 16 million offered something quite different. Tall, modern and impressive buildings vied for attention against the skyline. Here Western culture had made significant inroads. At the Yu Gardens complex, a restored part of old Shanghai, our first port of call had to be Starbucks- air-conditioned and familiar it resuscitated us, any guilt we might have harboured at succumbing so readily to our Western habits evaporating before our Americanos and iced coffee. A visit to the City Planning Exhibition revealed the amazing speed of development in Shanghai and their vision for the future. Our day ended with a trip to the Bund, now a wonderful waterfront promenade but in earlier times a port for the tea and opium trade, to view at sunset the spectacular views across the Huang Pu river.

> It was not all sight-seeing, however. The first weekend our pupils were fortunate enough to stay as guests with a Chinese family.

"The home stay was possibly the highlight of the whole China trip. It was a unique and interesting experience and a fantastic chance to view another culture at first hand. Any initial worries

were quickly dispelled by welcoming partners and parents. We were met with nothing but friendliness and hospitality for the whole weekend and the

families did their very best to make sure there was never a dull moment. There were slight problems with food, both quantity and quality. There was too much and it was too nice. Our partners seemed determined to get us to try every dish in China, ever! This caused problems with eating excessively and being too polite to say no. A weekend was not nearly enough time to settle in properly and it seemed we were leaving as soon as we were making friends, which was a shame. It was a great weekend and no doubt the start of several lasting friendships". Alex Spencer U6C.

The final day was spent in Hong Kong – a mad 24 hours to take in at breakneck pace the sights of this wonderful place with its mixture of British and Chinese culture under the expert guidance of Mr Brookin - Star ferry to Kowloon, a bus trip over the island to Stanley with spectacular views for all who managed to stay awake, ride on the Peak Tram to discover afresh the beauty of the islands, and at last some Western comforts to conclude the trip with that all important feel good factor.

My many thanks to Ms Adamson and Mr Brookin for their unstinting help, to the staff at the Suzhou Language School, in particular student Ben who looked after us so well and last but not least the students whose positive attitudes and appreciation of everything made the trip such a joy.



To use the additional car parking space proceed up the main drive by the Site Manager's bungalow, turn left under the first archway into the Dutch Barn and then proceed onto the tennis courts.

Please do not obstruct the first two archways into the Dutch Barn otherwise exiting becomes more difficult.

When parking on the tennis courts – use the right hand side to start with abutling the fence next to the cycle compound. Then use the left hand edge abutling the memorial garden. CSI:ENCE SUMMER INVESTIGATION 1 & 2 September 2008

On 1 & 2 September, just before the start of term, 61 students took part in the CSI:ence Summer Investigation (aka Science Summer School). Ms Prinsep, Ms Adamson, Mr Morgan, Mr Woolf, Mr Cole, Mrs Mee and Mrs McRitchie helped by Joe Lowe, Adam McNally, Ryan Moore, Ellis Thompson, Charlie Parker-Mowbray, Tanushree Nair, Ben Dingle and Sophia Wing, supervised a wide variety of fun and exciting forensic science activities. Mrs Chapman, Mr French and Mr Stewart, our team of wonderful lab technicians, supported the event by organising all the necessary resources for the activities and the all important refreshments.

On the first day the students carried out a facial reconstruction, examined at samples of hair, fibre and soil under the microscope, analysed a range of white powders, made plaster casts of their footprints and took cheek swabs in order to collect their own DNA. It was all great fun and there were prizes for the best face and the clearest footprint.

On the second day the students analysed a number of red liquids, carried out an analysis of blood types using simulated blood, put their DNA (collected on the first day) into vials to keep, took their own fingerprints, looked at the footprints they had cast on the first day and made models of the structure of DNA from liquorice allsorts and midget gums!

The final activity was a murder mystery – who killed Brian Aldridge? (Apologies to all fans of The Archers). The teams were presented with a file of evidence and profiles of the victim and the prime suspects by DI Perry (aka Mr Lynch). They had to decide who had committed the crime, what evidence they had to support their theory and decide on a possible motive. There was a prize for the "best" answer, and a number of teams did very well at this task.

Once again, Summer School was a huge success – the students told us how much they had enjoyed it! It was great to see so much enthusiasm and teamwork from Y7 & Y8.
