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LANGUAGES MORNING FOR Y9

Tuesday, 13th January 2009 Why learn a language? Doesn't everyone speak English?

Who needs languages anyway?

As pupils subject themselves to the rigours of learning vocabulary and the grammatical structures of a language they might well ponder these questions. The Languages Morning for Y9 set out to provide answers to these questions. Incidentally ninety-four percent of the world's population does not speak English as a first language and seventy-five percent of the world's population does not speak English at all.

The event was introduced by Penny Krucker, the International Education Officer for Gloucestershire. Her talk highlighted reasons for the necessity of improving our linguistic competence as a nation - we lag seriously behind our European partners in this respect. UK businesses are losing millions of pounds each year because their employees do not have language skills. Penny also focussed on languages as a key to furthering intercultural understanding and outlined some of the career choices available to people with languages.

For the second part of the morning Penny was joined by representatives from business, Stephen Suddell, Accounts Manager at Assystem UK Ltd. Richard Partos, International Trade Adviser for UK Trade &Investment and Chris Hughes MBE, Head of Language Services and Engagement at G.C.H.Q. Pupils had the opportunity to address their questions directly to this panel of experts and we all felt privileged to hear such excellent speakers. They left pupils in no doubt as to the value of learning languages and we hope some will have felt inspired to start learning a new language.

To conclude the morning taster sessions in Arabic, Greek, Mandarin Chinese, Polish and Japanese were all on offer.
