Y10 Geography visit to University of Gloucestershire

The Geography department has developed links with the University of Gloucestershire's Geography and Landscape Planning departments. This started last year with a number of our students visiting an exhibition of pupil work. The link has developed further this year and our three classes of GCSE pupils in Y10 had the opportunity to attend two workshops studying the urban growth of Gloucester.

In the first workshop students used Geographical Information System (GIS) software to study the patterns of Gloucester's growth. This was a fantastic session giving pupils detailed knowledge of GIS, a rapidly developing field of Geography, as well as supporting the demands of their GCSE syllabus. In the second workshop pupils studied areas of the city that were available for redevelopment such as the 'railway triangle' and presented ideas on how these areas could be utilised effectively.

This is a fantastic new link and the Geography department are very grateful to the staff of the University of Gloucestershire who put a significant amount of effort into ensuring the workshops were a success.



It is at times funny, with comic relief from the ignorant and selfish, and at others disturbing, as deep moral issues are tackled.

Overall, I am sad for those who missed what was a very well written Lynch and Crumblehulme production; incredibly well performed, creative, insightful, and of course, immensely enjoyable. I believe another production is in the pipeline, and I just can't wait. Who knows, the next venue might well be in the West End.

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Sixth Form Induction Week

This year's Sixth Form Induction Week was held between June 29 and July 3, with one hundred and eight prospective new Y12 students signing up for the programme.

The planned activities began in an entertaining, but thought-provoking manner, with the return of David Keeling from Independent Thinking, who gave a talk on what it means to be a Sixth Form student in the 21st Century. There can't be too many presentations where the whole audience is encouraged to jump and clap in unison, or to massage their neighbour's shoulders. I expect everyone who attended will also still remember the memory demonstration, including the teapot, the rugby ball and the cheese! The second session on Monday encouraged the students to talk to one another in small groups in order to solve a series of puzzles, which were designed to test different areas of the brain.

The most popular activity was based in the Wilderness Centre near Mitcheldean, where aroups were challenged to complete four problem-solving physical challenges, involving swinging from trees, stacking crates whilst standing on them and exploring tunnels on hands and knees. Each group was given a score based on how well they completed the task and how well they worked as a team. The Wednesday group ran out the eventual winners, but everyone agreed it was a great success. There was even a request to make the day longer, with more challenges included.

Meanwhile, back in school, another challenge set for the students was to create a virtual newspaper from scratch in a day. During the morning the groups of six students had to agree on their roles before choosing what type of newspaper they were going to produce. They then used wi-fi laptops to research and write a series of articles before preparing their work as a Powerpoint presentation. The results were presented to the other groups during the afternoon.

The week concluded with a series of extra-curricular 'taster' sessions, designed to give the students a flavour of the type of activities they might get involved in next year. These ranged from sports such as football and rugby, to table-tennis, drama and music and should ensure that life outside the classroom remains as varied and interesting as it has been in the past few years.

Refreshments were laid on afterwards as a reward for the excellent efforts of the students, both that morning and during the rest of the week. Once again, it was their positive approach that ensured the week was a success. They can now go away for a few weeks rest before GCSE results day. which will hopefully be the precursor to a challenging and enjoyable two years in the Sixth Form at Sir Thomas Rich's.






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Music Department


Sir Thomas Rich's/PMM Girls School Link

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
KS3 Art Exhibition

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SLIMBRIDGE BIOLOGY FIELD TRIP Jeremy Boyles 105

On Tuesday 9 June the whole of Y10, with waterproofs and wellies to hand, embarked upon an enjoyable and informative trip to Slimbridge Wildfowl and Wetlands Trust. On arrival we were directed to the interactive section of the centre where we watched a film regarding the founding of the Trust by artist and naturalist Sir Peter Scott in 1945 and the excellent work it does to protect the wetlands and their inhabitants throughout the UK. We were then split into our groups to tackle the different activities, the first activity which my group experienced was pond transecting using a net, we were trying to find out how many different types of organisms were present in their ponds. We found several water boatmen and the occasional areat diving beetle, but our rival group found fish in their pond.

We then proceeded to use a quadrat to try and ascertain how many different species of plants were present in each environment, including five different species of grass and the occasional dandelion. After all that we had worked up quite an appetite and so headed back to the picnic area to have lunch, where we attempted to play in the 'Childs play area' and feed the ducks and swans, of which two hissed at me.

Once lunch was over we then carried out several interesting practical experiments involving different chemicals; we tested the water of the different ponds and compared the pH and ammonia levels in each individual pond. To conclude the trip we were split into groups of three to investigate how many creatures were present in the forest. My group again didn't find much in the way of insects as our pitfall traps failed dismally, but I found a pigeon sitting on her nest in a privet bush. Thankfully the good weather held out for us and I wished I had taken my sunglasses in favour of my thick coat, regardless it had been a great day where we all enjoyed it immensely and learnt a wide range of skills outside of the classroom.



Y7 Founder's Trail

Y7 have enjoyed two History trips this term. The first was the founders trail where our boys learnt about the school's foundation by Sir Thomas Rich and its three-hundred and forty unbroken years of education, making it one of the oldest schools in the country. 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
Y7 Japanese Morning

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Y10 Cricket

Played 9 Won 5 Tied 1 Lost 3

This has been a successful season for a strong squad playing a very demanding fixture list, mostly away games against independent schools. The highlights of the season were two very close games, one won the other tied. Against Dean Close, we mounted a big score with Elliot Burge striking a powerful sixty. Our opponents fell short by three runs against disciplined bowling. RGS Worcester scored 201 for 5 batting first and with fifteen overs of our innings left, all seemed lost. However, the tail waaged vigorously led by Peter Reid, 43 not out, and with one ball and one wicket left, four were needed for a dramatic victory. The ball sped off a thick edge towards the third man boundary and three runs were scrambled for the tie. Losing off the penultimate ball to Marling in the County Cup quarter final was the only real disappointment. This was a real team effort, led beautifully by Will Pritchett with all contributing.

2nd XI Cricket

The school 2nd XI played three fixtures in the early part of this term, beating both our local rivals King's 2nd XI and the Crypt 2nd XI but losing to Rendcomb College 1st XI.

v Rendcomb - lost by 29 runs.

The season opener was an away match against Rendcomb's first team. Rendcomb batted first scoring 144 all out. The Rich's attack was led by *E Burge* from Y10 who returned figures of two wickets for 18 runs from 8 overs. *W Pritchett* (also Y10) bowled very accurately in the middle of the innings to claim four wickets for 18 runs. In reply Rich's lost regular wickets, until a late order partnership of 67 between *T Tremlett* (Y11) and *W Pritchett* gave the score some respectability. Rich's were bowled out for 115 to lose by 29 runs.

v King's - won by 64 runs.

The next fixture was away against Kings 2nd team. Rich's batted first in a 30 over a side match. Sound responsible batting from all the Rich's batsmen resulted in an impressive score of 197 for 7. *E Burge* top scored with 37 including 4 sixes, with useful contributions from *W Pritchett* (31) and *J Griffiths* (Y11, 28 not out). In reply King's scored quickly but lost regular wickets and were bowled out for 133. *J Griffiths* recorded the best figures of three wickets for 8 runs. Rich's winning by the comfortable margin of 64 runs.

v Crypt - won by 21 runs.

The home game against Crypt was also a 30 over per side match. Rich's batted first and enjoyed an opening stand of 93 between **N Drury** (72 - lots of flashy cuts and drives) and Head Boy **B Fabbro** (18 lots of solid defense). Quick runs then came from **J Griffiths** (38) and **T Tremlett** (35 not out) and the school closed on 179 for 4. The Crypt were never in the hunt, and eventually finished on 158 for 8. Rich's used nine different bowlers with **J Griffiths** recording the best figures of 3 for 20. Rich's winning by 21 runs.

The improvement the U14's have shown this year has been excellent. They have trained exceptionally hard; three times a week after school as well as weekly net sessions before the season started, has paid off. 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PMM GIRLS' SCHOOL Report on the school link visit - July 1-9th, 2009.

Wednesday,1/07/09: Departure from Entebbe Airport, Uganda was at 9:40 am with Mr. Birchall and his son in law, Jason boarded the BA062. We arrived at the Heathrow airport, London at 4:45pm only to be welcomed with shocking and extremely tropical hot weather! However lan's friend, John came over and drove us home where I had a short break and a cup of tea before being dropped at Mrs. Marian Brown's home to Cheltenham, my eventual place of abode for the next seven days.

Thursday, 2/07/09: Unlike back at home, I woke up at 5:30 am with darkness having vanished, but too early for the day's schedule only to discover the time difference of two hours ahead! Every other person was still asleep! Nonetheless, by 7:30am we were set to move to beat the traffic jam. Mrs. Brown, Head of Y8 drove me to school and led me to the common room where she introduced me to the staff that warmly welcomed me and made me feel at home. A cup of tea was served to set me up for the day! My first interaction with the students was the induction of the Y7's, new entrants for September. It was amazing to hear the Y9 initiating their peers with all the confidence and pride in their school. In the Geography department, I was able to observe four lessons. The Y12's a class of fifteen had such a wonderful pupil centred and a well enriched lesson by Mrs. Brown with every necessary gadget including visual and audio for effective teaching of the subject.

Mr. Gowler came in with fifteen year old pupils on comparative study of Urbanisation in the DCs and LDCs and Uganda as an example of the latter. It was very involved and impressive when both of us were team teaching with overwhelming participation of the class.

I drew a lot from the Y8 lesson taught by Mrs. Brown for PMMGS for the way it was well planned and carefully executed! It had a bearing of well planned scheme of work, use of a variety of references, teaching materials and methods including discussion groups and team teaching. She covered all the aspects of the subject in the most concise and precise manner and yet keeping the pupils at the centre of learning. While on induction of Y6, Mr. Morgan came in with a dynamic presentation of subject appreciation which I thought was marvellous for the new entrants.

In the afternoon, I was taken around the computer complex, laboratories and hub of the school by Mr. Birchall who explained to me how the school is not only networked but monitored at one base, and how technology can make school administration more effective.

Late afternoon, I was treated to a dinner in a nearby pub with the warm company of teachers. What impressed me most here was the high level of responsibility of the teachers; they kept time to the dot! Thereafter, we all converged at 6:00pm for School sports where the boys flexed their muscles with very high standards of competition. Westgate emerged the winners of the four houses.

Friday, 3/07/09 My first morning session was with a Y8 class where I witnessed the pupils go through their citizenship concerns and moved onto the programme of monthly fundraising for the sponsored students at PMM Girls School under the supervision of Mrs. Brown. She then took them through general questions about PMMGS, Jinja and Uganda as a whole which I did provide answers to. The lesson ended with a wonderful geography game, what creativity! I was then led to the Deputy Headteacher, Mr. Mike Seales where we discussed a lot of issues and on how we can improve upon our teaching, assessment for learning and promised to provide sample documents. He later escorted me to the Headmaster's office.

Mr. Kellie gave me a warm welcome to the school and went ahead to serve me a cup of tea and invited me to a staff 'DO' late in the evening. This was very humbling for me! STRS, you are blessed to have Mr. Kellie as your Head. He gave a briefing on the composition of the management of the school followed by general discussions on updates of the two schools through to lunch time. He led me to the canteen to join other teachers for lunch.

In the afternoon, Mr. Birchall drove me out for a brief tour of the town; a welcome interlude lafter a hectic morning and brought me back in time for a lesson in food science by Mr. Brown with a Y8 class. Mrs. Brown and I got back home to prepare for the teacher's party and in a couple of minutes we were done and were being driven to Tewkesbury a few minutes' drive to a prestigious Hotel and bar in the middle of a



golf course. It was a sombre moment because one staff member, Louise who is on a fast tracking teacher programme was bidding a farewell to the staff. I had just met her and found her of a likeable character. Best wishes to Louise in your next undertaking!

Saturday, 4/07/09 There was a break of the normal home school routine as we walked down along a very busy road in the centre of town, High Street for shopping, picked maps from tourist centre and back. In the afternoon, I had another walk with Mrs. Brown's brother and his fiancée to Pittville Park, Cheltenham for a fiesta to celebrate diverse communities, thanks to the sponsors!

We returned to settle down to lots of drinking and eating during dinner, which was brought home for the school staff and the hosts' parents. There was much fun as members played family fun games of golf and boxing! Cheers to Mr. Brown also.

Sunday, 5/07/09 A cool walk in the morning to the market passed Cheltenham Race course which had many people participating in the walk race to raise funds for the cancer centre.

Afternoon took us to Mrs. Browns parents' countryside home for a Sunday dinner with a treat of natural fruits and juices from their own local farm in Staverton .

Monday, 6/07/09 Back to school as usual, reporting at 8:00 am I was met by Mr. Seales who gave me a brief in his office on the week's programme and some teaching documents. Later he led me to assembly hall where the students and staff were gathered waiting for us to arrive; after a brief speech he invited me to address the assembly. I was overwhelmed with the discipline of the students and the due attention they gave me and yet at the end were very appreciative. He then took me to the IT room where I was introduced to 'Youtube' sites for enriched teaching and where I was able to print e-tickets for my flight 423 from Bristol to Edinburgh scheduled for Friday, 10th July at 06:45. On to the Sixth Form Common room to meet the girls of the school and I had a long discussion with them on the current status and general issues pertaining to female pupil education and work life. I did give a comparative assessment of the status quo of the women folk in the two countries which was the core of their interest.

After a refreshing lunch at the school canteen, I set off with Mr. Morgan for Ribston Hall High School, Stroud Road a twenty minutes' drive away where we were met by Ms. Glenda de la Bat Smit, who took me around the whole school explaining all issues of the school. I had discussions with Heads of Department of Geography and Mathematics on strategic approach to improving performance of the two subjects which I believe will help PMMGS.

Tuesday, 7/07/09 Mrs. Brown explained to me the importance of teaching Sustainability across the curriculum, and handed to me a copy that included Sustainable Food supply, Water supply, Energy and Cities to study.

At 10:15 am we set off with Y7 for a History study tour of Chedworth Roman Villa in Cirencester. Here I discovered the historic remains of one of the largest Romano-British Villas in the country and the possible origin of Christianity. We went further to Corinium Museum located in the Roman Cirencester once the second biggest Roman town outside London, today internationally reknowned for the quality and quantity of its archaeological collections of mosaic and history of the Cotswolds.

Opposite the great yew hedge is the Cirencester parish church, a magnificent and historic medieval building with its south porch as the old town hall but in need of refurbishment if it is to retain its original medieval status and attraction.

Wednesday, 8/07/09 Periods 1-3 was spent first with career guidance in the choice of universities for all Y12R and then Y12s and Y7s for Maths lessons where I discovered functional skills are used to make the teaching of Maths more practical in developing abilities to select the right tools and methods to solve different problems. I was able to discuss with the head of the department how we can improve the teaching of Maths. At 11:30am we set off for sight-seeing in Gloucester to see the Cathedral built around 678-9 AD by the medieval craftsmen and maintained by their descendants today. It was amazing to see the royal and medieval marvels, magnificent architecture and stained glass and a living place of worship with a great choral tradition. On our way to the English villages of Painswick we had a stopover for lunch.

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Thursday, 9/07/09. I called in to see the Bursar to confirm the transfer of the monies for my flight. At 10:30am Mr. Birchall drove me to Longlevens Junior School and we were met by Mr. Shane Gue the International Coordinator who conducted me around the school asking me to link them to a Ugandan school. at 12:15pm we visited the docks and had a heavy farewell lunch in Angel Chef, a Chinese restaurant At 2:15pm my study trip ended with an observation of a psychology lesson.

The wealth of experience I have received and the hospitality is great and the sky is the limit for the bond in this link.

Students' Survey

Questionnaires were issued to all our students in March and the completed forms were sent off to the same marketing company who analysed our previous survey in 2006. We have now received their report. 454 completed questionnaires were returned (57.1%) so statistically reliable data could be drawn except for Drama (GCSE), Classical Civilisation and Geology (A-Level).

Subjects

The Report compared scores with those in the 2006 survey, differences of over 5% are shown in brackets after the subject. A score of over 90% is considered 'exceptional' (in comparison with 30 similar schools across the country) – this was achieved by economics, religious studies, physics, business studies (+13.5%). Spanish (+6.8%), science (Y7), psychology, chemistry and German (+9.2%). Most other subjects scored in the 80-90% range, considered a 'good' score, with Food Technology (+15.4%) the only subject changed by over 5%. English was in the 70-80% 'satisfactory' range: a long-running staff absence within English, which undoubtedly adversely affected this score, has at last been resolved.

Non-Academic

Twenty wider school aims were included in the survey. Eleven achieved 'exceptional' ratings: careers advice, school facilities, availability of resources, control of bullying, choice of subjects, teaching quality, community spirit, levels of homework, developing confidence, caring teachers, happiness of child. The other areas were all rated 'good': school discipline, social health education, school communication, developing potential, school security, truancy control, exam results, computer access, developing moral values. No area was considered 'satisfactory' or below.

Our students gave an 'excellent' (85%) overall school performance score. Among students who have been

attending for over a year, 46% said the school had improved over the last year while 9% thought the school's performance was worse.

Additional Questions

Students were asked for their opinions on eleven further aspects of school life. They rated as 'exceptional': marking students' work, treating students fairly and equally, quality of school management, promoting racial harmony, transfer from previous school, celebrating and rewarding achievement. The other areas were rated as 'good': workload tailored to child, ensuring students do best and make progress, extra-curricular activities, encouraging and listening to parents' views, written reports.

What matters to students?

Students were asked to say which criteria are most important to them. Each could choose ten. When put together our students' rank order of what they feel is most important at school is shown, where 85% of students included the first criterion in their 'top ten', down to 19.5% who included the last criterion. A comparison with students at 38 similar schools (ranking in brackets after each criterion) shows broadly similar values, issues in bold print are those where our ranking is markedly different.


Students' priorities change as they progress through school e.g. control of bullying is the top concern in Y7 but drops to 10th in Y11+ and school discipline falls from 3rd to 9th; the only aspect which becomes significantly more important is careers advice which rises from 17th to 7th. Girls also had rather different priorities from boys e.g. caring teachers was 3rd (10th for boys) and developing potential was 4th (9th for boys); girls place less importance on school facilities – 12th (4th for boys) – and school discipline – 15th (5th).

The Report contains eighty-seven pages of data and analysis. Much is of real interest, even fascinating, although like all such statistics there are invariably different interpretations and explanations behind the figures. I have selected a few figures below which I thought might be of particular interest to parents:

The survey is gratifying to all staff at Rich's. We are never complacent, we are always striving to develop and improve. However it is heartening that our students are so positive about their experience at Sir Thomas Rich's.

We conduct a survey of all students every three years (hence in 2006 and 2009) and a similar survey of all parents every three years (our last was in 2007).



River Churn Fieldwork

Each of the Y7 form groups spent a morning or afternoon collecting data at three sites along the River Churn. We begin near the source of the river (Dowman's Farm) and measure the width and depth of the channel in groups of four. In addition, we also use a clinometer and a tape to measure the valley profile. By far the most exhilarating task is to time a dog biscuit floating down a section of the river in order to calculate the velocity.

Our next site is near to the village of North Cerney. The river is much wider and deeper and the river meanders across a flat valley floor. The boys complete more data collection and also draw a field sketch from the top of the valley.

Our final destination was on the edge of Cirencester, close to Stratton Mill. The river was much wider and the boys could see a well-developed floodplain and a more human environment. Similar data was recorded and we were able to produce some useful work back in the classroom in our final weeks of the summer term.


