

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Y11 VISIT TO THE HOLOCAUST EXHIBITION

The trip we experienced last week was a truly enlightening experience as I began to understand the true extremities of the dictatorship of Adolf Hitler. Once off the coach we were given thirty minutes to look around the main museum area to stretch our legs after a long and mildly entertaining journey. We then proceeded to the exhibition of the Holocaust where we were surprised to find Sally, Mr Pitel's mother! This was a shock and we were very interested to find out her opinions of our esteemed teacher. We were met by Ruth, our workshop leader, who experienced first-hand the chaotic occurrences of the Holocaust. We learnt that, tragically, her father died in the early years and she then fled with her mother to Britain after queuing for hours to be allowed to travel from Czechoslovakia. We proceeded to walk around the exhibition, armed with headsets, in a very sombre mood due to the atrocities we were witnessing. One of the exhibits that particularly troubled me was the collection of children's paintings that were obtained from an old children's home that was set up for young Jews. These paintings had been the last memories of the parents who in later years discovered that their children had been heartlessly murdered during the war. This and many other atrocities touched me deeply and really demonstrated how lucky we are to live in an era of relative peace and prosperity.'


