We are very aware that the emergency contact information on many pupils has become out of date. Our receptionist regularly tries to contact parents who have failed to update their child's records.






LAST ORDERS FOR YEAR 10

On Wednesday 30 September Year 10 attended a theatre and workshop in the school hall presented by Solomon Theatre group. They have been touring schools in Gloucester showing a gritty and thought provoking sketch on underage drinking and the potential harm that young people can experience.

The play is based on a real story and is told through a mixture of humour and harsh reality. The students are then encouraged to discuss the events, the legal implications and the moral aspects. Issues raised by this event will be further explored in PSHE lessons and tutor periods. A particular lesson for students to take away is the notion that peer pressure is only brought about by those who are uncomfortable in their own actions and are seeking to involve others for their own assurance.

Feedback from the students has been very positive.


On the first wet day for ages our group of English AS level students set off for Stratford upon Avon; upon arrival we were ushered into the expansive Shakespeare centre and led through a maze of exhibitions celebrating the life and work of this literary genius. One of the exhibits was the original text compiled by actors at the Globe and another a signet ring found in the churchyard. We eventually arrived at his birthplace, a roomy beamed cottage.

Experts hosted each of the rooms of the proud house and we were surprised to find a grand four poster bed in the parlour; a bed not for sleeping in but for showing off the status of the family to the locals in Stratford. In one of the bedrooms, languishing on a window seat, lay an actress propped against the lintels. Book in hand she gazed forlornly through the window and recited love poems written by the bard himself.

William seemed more interested in the story telling of a wealthy heiress, who just happened to be his Mother than the dexterity needed to cut leather and he enjoyed his studies at the local grammar school especially the classics and the works of Ovid. William enjoyed reworking the tales and crafting his own version of the stories in plays that he could then direct. He took his words to the more sophisticated audiences in London and earned a living to support his new wife and family back in Stratford.

Sadly the wife of Othello, Desdemona wasn't so lucky and our lecturer for the afternoon Dr Suzanne Staples led us, with enormous enthusiasm through this compelling tale of jealousy, malice and manipulation. Our students answered questions with real insight and the work sheets were thoughtfully organised to encourage group discussion. During the question and answer session at the end we were reminded of the power of the 'interrogative' genre of tragedy.

We came away from Stratford with a real sense of the historical, literary and social context of Shakespeare's plays, as well as some very useful notes and ideas to inform further study.

At each site, the boys completed a fieldsketch and took notes. We also measured the angles of the beach West of Durdle Door and measured hundreds of pebbles!


The coursework is now well underway in lessons and makes up 20% of their final grade. The deadline for handing in the final part of the coursework is Friday 6th November.
