#### **NEW PUPILS**

We have one hundred and twelve boys in Y7 who join us from 65 different primary schools. The new Year 12 has one hundred and twenty students of whom 39 join us from other secondary schools. 33 of Year 12 are girls, making a total of 59 girls in our Sixth Form. Total student numbers are 801 (compared with 795 in September 2008).

#### **EXAMINATION RESULTS**

We were delighted that our students achieved excellent examination results this summer.

The details are as follows:

#### **GCSE**

This was our best ever set of GCSE results by a significant margin. Very well done to last year's Y11 students who worked hard for their examinations. The average points score per candidate (based on A\*=58, A=52, B=46, etc.) was 569 which equates to an average of almost eleven A grades per student. This was the highest score of all the county schools, including the other six grammar schools. 63% of grades were A and A\*. The average number of GCSEs passed per student was 11.3. 100% of our students gained at least 5 passes at grade C and above.

Most boys in Y10 took GCSEs in English Literature and R.S., with some taking maths too. They achieved impressive results, 64% at grades A/A\* (compared with 41% in 2008), which bodes well for their GCSE examinations next summer.

Congratulations to the six boys who took Geology GCSE at the end of Year 9, having completed the course in just one year, studying three lunchtimes each week. All passed, three at A\*.

In the AS examinations, taken at the end of Year 12, the pass rate was 98.3%. 59% of entries were at grades A and B, grade A was the commonest grade. Good foundations have been laid for the students' A-level examinations next year.

#### A-Level

The A-level pass rate was 99.7%, the average number of A-levels gained per candidate was 4. Of all entries 71% passed at grades A and B, 90% at grades A to C. The average UCAS points score (based on A= 120, B=100, C=80, etc.) was 403.6. These fine results ensured that most students were able to progress to their first choice of university.




#### Visit to the Milestone, 14th July 2009

Fortunately it was extremely docile. Afterwards we had lunch in the tranquil town of Arenas.

On Wednesday we visited the Tito Bustillo caves, which consist of ancient cave drawings and magnificent chambers enriched with interesting geographical architecture. We spent the afternoon on the beach, and had a sand sculpture competition. There were original ideas including a tortoise, castle settlement and sculpture of the Pope, which attained first place, however all believe Mrs Spilsbury's flower should have won! After we swam in the sea under supervision, and all enjoyed body surfing in the waves.





On Thursday there was a trip to Oviedo, the capital of Asturias. Following Mr Hearn's town trail was interesting and worthwhile, giving us an insight into the city's history. #### **Australia Rugby Tour 2009**

After jetting off from Heathrow on Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> July we landed in Brisbane on Monday 13<sup>th</sup> having changed planes in Abu Dhabi and refuelled in Singapore; it's a long flight but well worth it!

As in 2007 we spent the first 4 nights of the Tour at the magnificent Sports Super Centre on the Gold Coast where the squad of 40 players trained very hard. There was also time to relax and enjoy the superb facilities under the wall-to-wall Aussi blue skies and sunshine, including an out-door 50M pool and beach volley-ball court!

Within 24 hrs of arriving on the Gold Coast we were playing our first fixture against The Southport School, one of Queensland's most prestigious Independent Schools, who regularly have over 2000 people watching their 1st XV! The Seconds put up a solid performance but were well beaten by a powerful side 37-0. The Firsts though came back from behind to win a pulsating match 17-12; it was a great performance which boosted the confidence of the whole squad and set the tone for the rest of the tour.

Our stay on the Gold Coast also included visits to Surfers Paradise, a beautiful surfing beach, and Dreamworld, a Theme and Water Park.

A 2 hour internal flight took us south to Melbourne in the State of Victoria, a wonderful place of 3.5 million people set on the Yarra river.

The boys were billeted out with the families of pupils from Melbourne Grammar School, an experience they thoroughly enjoyed. On Sunday 19th we played our second pair of fixtures against the Victoria State U18 and U16 XVs, two very strong sides; the U18 side included five Australian Schools U18 Internationals – we were expecting a couple of tough challenges! The Seconds played first and were well beaten 67-5. The Firsts though were far more competitive in all areas, particularly in the first half and, in fact, were leading 13-12 until just before half time. However, the far greater power of the Victorian XV told in the second half and they ran out comfortable winners 45-13.

The following day the Firsts produced an impressive performance to beat Melbourne Grammar School, a large all boys Independent School 27-7, and the seconds were narrowly defeated 26-25 in the dying seconds of a thrilling match against the 1st XV of Haileybury Grammar School.

Apart from playing two memorable games of rugby, a lot of friendships were forged during our 4 night stay in the State of Victoria, one of the many benefits of such a tour. We have made some very good contacts in this lovely part of the world and at the start of December of this year will be hosting the Victoria State U16 Tour Party for 3 nights; potential host families should start stocking up on protein supplies now – they are a big bunch of lads!

On Tuesday 21st we had an 11 hour coach journey north to the capital, Canberra. On the way our knowledge of Australian birds was enriched by our resident expert on the subject, Mr Swann, and we stopped off at the Don Bradman Oval and Museum in his home town of Bowral.

The following day we played our last pair of fixtures against St Edmund's College, Canberra, one of the top five rugby union-playing schools in Australia. St Eddies' list of rugby-playing alumni is rather impressive and includes the likes of George Gregan, Matt Giteau and Matt Rogers.

The 1st XV were first to play on an excellent pitch, which had its own stand, and as in the match against the Victoria Schools' XV they dominated territory and possession for much of the first half, putting their illustrious opponents under great pressure with wave after wave of impressive attacks. Unfortunately, we could not convert the pressure into points and as we tired in the second half St Eddies showed their class and won the match 30-3, a score-line which in no way reflected the balance of play or, indeed, the outstanding rugby played by our boys.

In the final match of the Tour, the Seconds put in a magnificent effort against a very strong St Eddies 2<sup>nd</sup> XV but went down 15-7 in an end-to-end battle which could have gone either way.

Having completed our 8 matches the last 3 days of the Tour were spent at leisure in Sydney. A lot was packed in, including visits to the Telstra Stadium where 'Johnny' dropped 'that goal' and the Sydney Tower, jet-boating in the Harbour, a ferry ride to Manley, Harbour Bridge climb an end-of-tour dinner on a floating restaurant [ the Steyne] in Darling Harbour and, of course, even more bird-watching with Mr Swann!

Although the overall results look disappointing, they don't reflect most of the performances produced by both sides, particularly the Seconds, and the Tour was a great success both on and off the field. It is important now for the squad to build on this superb pre-season experience in the forthcoming domestic fixtures and for Mr. Williams and myself to start planning our next 'excursion'!

Very well done to the whole squad – you were, as always, great ambassadors for the School!

Ms Prinsep, Ms Adamson, Mr M Morgan and Mr Cole, helped by Alex Ford, Ryan Moore, Joe Alderman, Emily Rawlins and Josh Reid, supervised a variety of fun and exciting science activities. Mrs Chapman and Mr Boon, our wonderful lab



technicians, supported the event by organising all the necessary resources for the activities.

On the first day the students undertook three challenges. They had to design aliens from green slime and show how they were adapted for life on Mars, with the winner receiving a prize. They made rockets – always a popular activity – and the best three were awarded prizes. The third challenge was to build a lander that would safely deposit a fresh egg on the ground, having been dropped from a great height. A prize was awarded to the team that successfully completed the challenge for the minimum cost.



On the second day the students undertook two longer challenges. They had to build a paper structure that would support a weight suspended from the top. The winning team built the tallest structure that could support the greatest weight. Their second challenge required them to build a motorised buggy from Lego that could negotiate sand, gravel and pebbles. Again, there were



prizes for the winners. This was another fantastic day and it was great to see so much enthusiasm and teamwork.

Once again, Summer School was a huge success – the students told us how much they had enjoyed it! No one went home empty handed as all of the participants received a T-shirt and an egg from which to grow their own alien!

#### **Wildlife Pond**

During the summer break the Technicians began to do some clearing in and around the pond. We spent several hours dragging debris out of it and have used the pallets taken out to make a compost container for the plant material that we removed. There are lots of brambles to cut back to enable us to get all round the pond so that we can clear the edges and provide safe dipping stages. We have cleared and repaired one of the bridges which will enable us to get equipment closer to the areas to be cleared.

Already we have seen several types of dragonfly and other insects visiting the cleared areas of the pond. There is a variety of shrubs and plants which we are hoping to clear and prune so that we will encourage more interesting species to this area. The pond has a wide range of aquatic life in it and it will definitely be a good dipping pond by next Spring so that we do not have to go elsewhere to carry out this part of the curriculum.

There is a possibility that we can use the compost heap to provide evidence of our Green School capability and also some scientific data for evaluation.

We are very grateful to the PA for funding the improved fencing and we are hopeful that their keen interest will also provide us with extra help in what is obviously a very laborious job but a very worthwhile one.

We are also hoping for some practical help in improving the layout of the area, as well as bringing in new features, from the Environment Agency.

Any volunteers (willing or otherwise) will be very welcome to help on any of our weekend clearing sessions. Watch out for further information on these but October 18<sup>th</sup> is a possible date for your diary. Please let the technicians or the Biology Department know if you can help.

#### Year 12 Trip to China July 2009

After a 5am start from School, flights from Heathrow to Helsinki and then on to China, 20 members of Year 12 and 3 members of staff arrived in Shanghai at 7am local time. Having negotiated the masked officials with thermal cameras watching for swine flu sufferers, we were met by Xavier from the Suzhou Foreign Language School which

was to be our home for the next week.

THE WAS ASSESSED.

During our stay, we experienced a mixture of lessons in calligraphy, martial arts, Tai Chi and Mandarin, just enough to enable us to say hello and goodbye and to barter shopkeepers down to get the best deal on souvenirs. Visits in and around Suzhou gave us a small

glimpse of the culture and traditions of China ancient and modern, such as the water village of Tongli, a world heritage site with its many canals and bridges,

the Suzhou museum – designed by the architect I M Pei – and just a few of the city's famous gardens. A day in Shanghai was also one of the highlights, despite the torrential rain. We spent time in the Yu gardens, where a number of traditional buildings have been preserved and also saw the amazing development of Shanghai in the City Planning Museum. Finally, a wander along the celebrated Nanjing Road, famed for its department stores and designer shops was spoilt only by the heavens opening.





As it turned out, the downpour in Shanghai was an early warning of the disappointment to follow – the best total eclipse of the century was

completely hidden by low cloud and persistent rain. The true Tommies spirit was in evidence though, as the boys 'enjoyed' the rain, building a (very wet) human pyramid and staying out to experience the darkness fall as the eclipse reached totality at about 9:45am.

This was our last day in Suzhou and that night we packed up our bags and caught the sleeper train to Beijing, to spend a few days visiting some of the most

famous places that China has to offer.

In a 3 day whirlwind tour of Beijing, we managed to see the Great Wall, the Forbidden City, Tiananmen Square, the Summer Palace, the Temple of Heaven and the old Hutong area as well as China's newest tourist attractions, the Water Cube and the Bird's Nest Stadium. In the evenings, we saw an acrobat show and experienced a proper Peking Duck dinner to celebrate the end of our visit. Finally, I want to thank all of the students and Mr Morgan and Miss Prinsep for making the whole trip so enjoyable and such a great success, as well as Mrs Hewett for doing all of the organisation and planning be-
