SNOW

Despite some dreadful travel conditions early in the term we managed to keep disruption to a minimum. We felt obliged to close the School at lunchtime on Tuesday 5th January as snow fell and transport became a concern. Further snow fell during the night which caused hazardous road conditions on Wednesday. Freezing temperatures then left side roads and the school site in a dangerous state, so we remained closed on Wednesday and Thursday. On Friday we opened for Years 11, 12 and 13 - 55 of our 60 teachers and around 80% of students were in school. We returned to normal the following week. Snow returned on Tuesday/Wednesday night leading to many school closures, indeed travel conditions were probably the worst encountered, but we remained open for all pupils. Thanks go to all - staff, students, parents - who went to great lengths to come into school but I would pay particular tribute to those staff who live in outlying areas who showed tremendous commitment in risking travel on dangerously icy roads and thus minimised disruption to our students' education.

PERFORMANCE TABLES

Earlier this term the Government published its annual summary of schools' GCSE and A-level results from last summer. The delay is caused by the time taken for appeals and re-marks to be finalised. Newspapers publish the same league tables the day after results are issued in August, but these are based on figures submitted by the schools themselves. So the January *School and College Achievement and Attainment Tables* are the first official version.

The indicators the Government selects are, with our results, at GCSE:

- all our students achieved five or more passes at grades A*-C including English and maths;
- the average points score per student was 532.8 (based on A*=58, A=52, B=46, etc.);
- value added from entry in Year 7 to GCSE was 1009.4 (scores above 1000 represent schools where pupils on average made more progress than similar pupils nationally);
- overall absence was 4.0%, persistent absence 0.4% (these were, as last year, the lowest figures of all county schools).

At A-Level:

- the average points score per student was 1015.0 (grade A=270, B=240, C=210, etc.);
- the average points score per examination entry was 224.0.

The central characters are Galileo (played by Alex Gaumond) an outcast of the "Ga-Ga" kids and Scaramouche (Sarah French-Ellis). They are both on par from the "Ga-Ga" world and eventually meet after they are arrested for trying to brainwash the other "manufactured" teenagers. The musical is centred around the quest to revive "genuine" music and extinguish Killer Queen for good. Along with the superb storyline is the chance to sing along with the cast to the likes of "I Want To Break Free", "We Are The Champions," "Don't Stop Me Now", and of course, "Bohemian Rhapsody".



The cast also included Jonathan Wilkes, Kevin Kennedy and Georgina Hagen who all performed flawlessly throughout the show, further improving the experience. Behind the set the live band produced a breathtaking performance which accompanied the story throughout the duration. However, the highlight of the experience was the cast's vocals. Here is a performance which includes genuine singing talent, most notably by Sarah French Ellis (Scaramouche); none of that Jedward rubbish thankfully!

All in all, a thoroughly enjoyable night. Not one pupil or member of staff left Bristol feeling even the slightest bit disappointed. We were very pleased to finally welcome Penny Krucker to school to speak to year 9 pupils about the importance of learning languages, a talk which had been postponed due to the snowy conditions and school closure.



Mrs Spilsbury: ***"The talk raised awareness of the advantages of learning 2 modern languages and the doors which languages can open for pupils."***

Mr M. Morgan: ***"A useful insight was given into the importance of language learning in particular with regard to careers in business, especially multi-national companies."***

It was rather shocking to find that language skills in Britain are the worst in Europe. 75% of the world's population do not speak English at all and British businesses lose millions every year because their employees cannot speak a foreign language- hardly grounds for complacency. Languages enable us to gain an understanding of different cultures and countries and to travel abroad for work or pleasure. They open up exciting career paths and give a head start in the job market. These were just some of the reasons that Penny gave for learning languages.

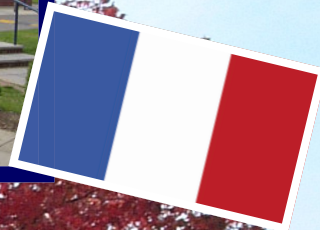
I was very much encouraged to learn that language teachers are amongst the most intellectual in the teaching profession- learning a foreign language increases intelligence. Other research has highlighted further benefits- Britons who learn a foreign language are richer, happier and are regarded as sexier than those who can only speak English.

In the Gloucester District Basketball tournament the u16's finished third, the u15's lost in the final and came second but the u14's won the competition.

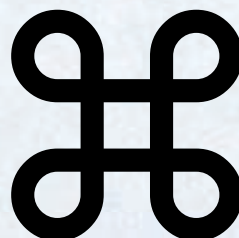
They will now represent Gloucester City in the Gloucestershire Basketball tournament.
