Tory Talks Taxation to Tommy's

Richard Graham. prospective Conservative candidate for Gloucester, and Richard Hammond, Shadow Chief Secretary to the Treasury, visited to 211 talk to Sixth Form Economics students. Richard Graham spoke first about local issues, quizzing students on their views on how to improve local services. Students grilled him on local budget cuts affecting health services and voiced their concerns over public sector job losses. Richard Hammond spoke for a short while about the main problems facing the economy and how they planned to cut the government debt and budget deficit, though he conceded that there was disagreement among professional economists about the best way to solve the budget crisis.

At the end of the discussion some students had the chance to speak individually and raise further queries. A wide range of areas were discussed, for instance, proportional representation, the university places crisis, an elected House of Lords and social mobility.

History Trip – The Holocaust Exhibition, Imperial War Museum, London



I was feeling slightly apprehensive on the morning of this trip, as I did not know what to expect. I was not of course expecting the exhibition to be enjoyable as such; interesting and engaging, almost certainly, but the exhibition is not designed to be uplifting. Asking Mr Daniell about the trip he echoed my thoughts, 'humbling' was his description. Having been around the exhibition I can only agree with Mr Daniell's opinion. The first half of the exhibition was dedicated to the build up to the Holocaust and the Nazi's racial and social views. This is only a preview to the shocks in the second half. To quote the Imperial War Museum Website 'The silence and intensity of emotion only deepens as you go further into the exhibition'. This was shown in the audio guide that we listened to, the originally passive voices on the other end of the headphones gradually becoming more empathetic. The atrocities that faced the Jews in Eastern Europe in this time are truly incomprehensible. Millions were killed, and the exhibition lays the facts down bare before you to make of it what you will. It puts all current problems into perspective, and was definitely something that I will not forget. Humbling; indisputably.



Origin of International Mother Tongue Day.

The origin of International Mother Tongue Day lies in the aftermath of the bloody partition of India and Pakistan in 1947. The nation now known as Bangladesh was East Pakistan after the partition. Even though over half of Pakistan's 69 million inhabitants lived in East Pakistan, the country was largely ruled from West Pakistan's central government. In 1948 the central government declared Urdu as the nation's only official language. This meant Bengali, the native language of over 90% of the people of East Pakistan (and thus one of the most spoken languages in the world) could not be taught in school or used in government affairs. The change also threatened to make the majority of educated people of East Pakistan essentially 'illiterate' and unable to participate in government or hold national posts.

This understandably outraged the East Pakistanis, and a Bengali Language Movement formed. In February 1952 Dhaka University planned mass protest demonstrations, but the central government imposed a ban on all public assemblies in the city of Dhaka. On February 21 students held the protest anyway.

Police attacked the students with batons. Students fought back, throwing bricks at the police, who responded with tear gas and gunfire. Several students were killed. The outcry over the police attacks led to more demonstrations and violence over the following days. On February 22 police attacked a mourning rally, presumably for violating the ban on assemblies.

After two more years of protest Pakistan passed a resolution accepting Bengali as a national language of Pakistan along with Urdu, and the anniversary of the first martyrs was adopted by UNESCO as International Mother Language Day in 1999.

Celebrations at Widden Primary School

It was a privilege to be invited to Widden Primary School and to join in the celebration of International Mother Language Day with the Bengali Community. Children performed poems and songs in their native Bangla and colourful pictures, painted by the children, were on display.

These pictures symbolised aspects of life in Bangladesh and the struggle to preserve the Bengali language. It was in honour of this struggle that inspired International Mother Language Day.

STRS has supported the learning of Bengali for a number of years and regular classes now take place every Saturday morning. This year will see the first cohort sit their A2 examinations, having already successfully completed GCSE and AS. We are delighted to be able to support the Bengali community.









UNESCO proclaimed 21st February an International Mother Language Day in 1999 and ever since there have been annual celebrations on this day to raise awareness of the importance of cultural and linguistic diversity and multilingual education. As indigenous languages die out, ancient cultures disappear. In February the death of Boa Sr, the last speaker of the ancient tribal language, Bo, in the Andaman Islands. made headline news.

Work Experience in Aachen – Germany

During February half-term eight of the y12 German class went to Aachen for a week's work experience in Germany. The group really enjoyed their educational and personal experience. After all, they all spoke between 6 and 8 hours solid German each day (what more would a teacher want!) and were looked after well by the group organiser. This is what they said about the trip:

"I thoroughly enjoyed my work experience, working in a cake shop, as it helped me to develop my understanding of German language and culture. Going during 'Karneval' allowed us to sample a fantastic German celebration that none of us will forget. I feel confident for my exams and would seriously recommend the experience to anyone studying a foreign language." Dale Lewis.

"I worked in a supermarket from Monday to Friday. I had to work long hours, but I enjoyed talking to my colleagues and some of the tasks were fun, for example building a tower of baked bean tins (although I dropped two on my first day). I learnt a lot of German and met some people whom I will stay in touch with." *George Eden*

"I was working in a gift shop called Nanu-Nana. I was involved in general retail tasks like helping to organise stock and helping, and talking to, customers. My German vastly improved by working eight hours a day and speaking solely German to my employer and customers. Altogether, it was a difficult challenge but very worthwhile and the social activities were also great." Abdu Afifi

"The German work experience was a great challenge, not only speaking German on a constant day to day basis, but living for a week in a foreign country. I can say at the end of it, that I am much more confident in my German speaking ability, something which will hold me in good stead for my exams." *Will Lee*

"When I joined the school in Year 7, I never envisioned that 5 years later I would be in a hotel full of strangers, in Germany, with only my German-speaking skills to help me survive. But now, five years later, I can proudly say that I have been, and it was one of the best experiences of my life thus far. I ate lots of



amazingly tasty food: sausages, doughnuts and almost any other pastry you can imagine were present, ready to be eaten – which I certainly did, and in no small quantities". *Oliver Stockley*

"I spent the week working in a German solicitors which tested my German ability greatly and allowed me to pick up new vocabulary for future use. Whilst working I was asked to read current case files, ready for multiple trips to the court to observe trials. On the Monday, I was able to see a piece of German culture I never thought I would 'Karneval'; people in large parade floats throwing sweets into the crowd and viewers in fancy dress holding out umbrellas in an effort to catch as many as they can. Overall, the trip was great not only for the work but the experiences that will never be forgotten". *Callum Bridgmount-John*

"During my week of work experience I worked at Aachen Tierpark. Not only was it an extremely enjoyable trip on a social front but it was also incredibly beneficial for my German education. Working alone in a foreign country helped me with my confidence and independence." *Anwen Carter*

Badminton Court News

This year we entered teams into all three Gloucestershire leagues at U14, U16 & U19 levels.

Both the U14 & U16 league competitions were restructured to feed the County winners into the Badminton England National Schools Competition. This returned the format of the fixtures to gender specific competition, with teams of only 4 instead of the previous 'merit league' format of six per team. STRS decided to therefore enter an "A" & "B" team at both competition levels.

We were the only school to do this and with both our "A" & "B" teams being placed in the same divisions, this made organising fixtures against other schools a little awkward and meant our "A" team had to play our "B" team in an official league match. This made team selection a little interesting at times, especially as the decision to make the U16 "A" team a Year 11 team and the U16 "B" team a Year 10 team, probably weakened the chances of either beating stronger sides in their division.

However as things turned out, we found our opposition in the Gloucester & Stroud divisions of the league few and far to come by as several schools dropped out of the competition once the season was underway. In fact in the U16 competition only Crypt and ourselves remained – a most unsatisfactory situation which the organisers need to address before next season.

The U19 competition continued to be run on the 'merit league' format meaning mixed teams of six. There being no Badminton England National Schools competition for U19 level the pinnacle would be Gloucestershire County Champions.

U19 Gloucestershire Badminton League

Freddie Speed and Amit Patel, our regular 1 & 2 players, found opposition a lot tougher than in last year's U16 competition, with several county squad players and one of national calibre lining up against us. We won by comfortable margins the fixtures against Cheltenham Ladies College (8-1) and Bredon (6-3) but succumbed to Pates (2-7) and KLB (3-6).

U16 Gloucestershire Badminton League

In their only fixture against Crypt, both STRS "A" & "B" suffered heavy match defeats, although individual games were closely fought and scored. The "A" Team went down 1-4 and the "B" Team, while gaining useful match experience, suffered a 0-5 defeat. Given no further league fixtures, the focus for the teams was lost - overall a disappointing outcome.

Their only other fixture against other schools was declared a walkover and with the "A" team expectedly beating the "B" team 5-0, this left the "A" team winners of the Gloucester & Stroud division.

Having won their division, the U14 "A" team took part in the county finals event at Wycliffe school. In the semi-finals an extremely close and well-fought contest against KLB (3-2) took our boys through to an easier final contest against Pates, which they won 5-0.

Congratulations to Kit Kirby, Dan Jones, Michael Lyons, Joe Colonna and Joe Carolan – the "A" team squad, on their county success.

A fortnight after winning the county trophy, the squad were taking part in the Southwest Regional Finals at Exeter University, against the county champions from Cornwall, Devon, Dorset, Somerset, Hampshire and Wiltshire. As in previous years, this proved to be a monumental step-up in standards of play and really exposed the enormous gap in support given at county level between Gloucestershire and its southwest county rivals. The other counties all seem to benefit extensively from funding and expertise provided by Badminton England specifically for schools, which Gloucestershire appears not to be tapping into.

Nevertheless, the day provided great experiences and a golden opportunity for the boys to see and pit themselves against regular county, regional and even junior international players. The final results placed us sixth out of the seven counties. Well done to the squad for reaching this far and all the keen-as-mustard players involved in Junior Badminton at Rich's.

Thanks must also go to Mr Lloyd for his time and devotion to supporting and moving forward this oft-considered "minor" and "part -time" sport, which nevertheless provides an important opportunity and active outlet for boys who are may not be involved in the more mainstream sports.
