Examination success results from knowing the subject AND good examination technique: our students have plenty of practice in taking exams, under formal arrangements, which they invariably regard as having been helpful when they come to 'the real thing'.



UK Mathematics Trust Team Maths Challenge



Sir Thomas Rich's joined with 1300 other schools in entering a team into the UKMT team competition for pupils in years 8 & 9. Our regional heat was at Wycliffe College on Wednesday 24th March where we competed against 30 schools from Gloucestershire and Worcestershire.

The Rich's team, selected after a qualifying competition in school for our brightest young mathematicians, comprised Ben Smith (9R), Zakee Ulhaq (9B), Luke Jackson (8S) and Sam King (8R).

The day long competition involved 4 rounds of problems. The puzzles required great mathematical agility combined with excellent numeracy skills as well as the ability to think logically and laterally. Most of the events were conducted in pairs, some needing quick thinking and calculation as the team raced to answer problems as rapidly as possible while others needed the ability to tackle problems not usually seen in a maths classroom. The relay round even required some running!

The Rich's team performed very well in 2 of the rounds, and recorded one of the highest scores of any school in the final round, but 2 weaker rounds left us outside the top few places. The competition was won by King's Worcester.

Below are a few of the questions from the competition:

A runner completed 2 laps of a track. On the first lap she jogged at 3mph and on the second she ran at 6mph. What was her average speed over the 2 laps?

101 – 102 = 1 Wrong! Correct this equation by moving one digit.

What is the unit's digit of 1310?

To find out the answers see Mr Robson (by the way the answer to q1 is not 4.5mph).

Y13 North Wales Field Course



From the 16th to the 19th of March the Upper Sixth geography students embarked on a field trip to Snowdonia in north Wales. The main aim of the trip was to gain a wider understanding of the processes occurring within glacial landscapes. Our base camp for the three nights was a youth hostel located in Llanberis not far from Mount Snowdon, and we were lucky enough to have no other groups staying so those late night class room sessions didn't disturb any other people! The food was very hearty and calorie- packed which is exactly what the geographers needed after the long days out.

On the first day of travelling we encountered the different "zones" of Snowdonia's glacial landscape and drew the first of our many field sketches. We then arrived at the hostel and unpacked our bags, followed by dinner, giving just enough time to have a field work lesson lasting until 9.30pm (which happened every night).

Throughout the next few days we encountered many glacial landforms such as arêtes, moraines, cirques, Snowdon's pyramidal peak, roche moutonnées, and many more. Seeing these landforms in front of our eyes instead of the 2D text book diagrams, we were able to grasp the concepts of the glacial processes far more easily. We walked through the Nant Ffrancon Valley; a dramatic glacial trough carved out by a glacier in the Devensian Ice age, over 14,000 years ago. Here, we drew sketches of the rock step, roche moutonnée, protalus rampart, to name but a few. We also trekked up to the Cwm Idwall cirque to view the impressive cirque lake before heading back to the minibus for our packed lunch.

Two of the major excursions that we undertook included the visit to the Dinorwig Pumped Storage Hydro-Electric power station constructed inside "Electric Mountain" where we had a tour and a talk about how the cirque lake and ribbon lake combined to produce the electricity needed to prevent blackouts in the country during peak demand (eg Eastenders tea breaks). We were also lucky enough to have a train ride on the Ffestiniog Railway, one of Wales' most important tourist attractions, which was originally opened in 1836 for the transport of slate from the mines at Blaenau Ffestiniog to the port of Porthmadog.

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Göttingen - Joint German Exchange with Denmark Road High School

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

COMENIUS PROJECT, 2009 – 2011



RESPONSIBLE USE OF THE NEW TECHNOLOGIES



Education and Culture Lifelong learning programme COMENIUS

Much progress has been made with the Comenius project which was set up in 2009 with the I.E.S.Reyes Católicos School in Ejea de los Caballeros, Spain and the Institut-Cardijn Lorraine in Arlon, Belgium. Under the guidance of Professor Mariano Chóliz from Valencia university the schools are researching the addiction of pupils to the new technologies. The first meeting took place in Spain in November 2009. Questionnaires were drawn up for use in the three schools during the spring term. A DVD has been produced by the university of Valencia, outlining the risks of ad diction and providing indicators of addiction. Mr Crumblehulme, Head of Psychology, has worked with year 12 pupils to deliver the programme to years 7-11.

A second meeting has now taken place at Sir Thomas Rich's and this has enabled the countries to carry out an initial analysis of the results of the surveys. Time was taken out to visit Bath and enjoy an evening playing skittles – all in the interests of friendly international relations. My many thanks to leuan Lavendar (8B) and Mitchell Bevan (10R) and their families for hosting the Belgian pupils.

Comenius projects are school-based projects funded by the EU with the aim of enhancing the European dimension of school education, in particular by encouraging international cooperation between schools and promoting intercultural awareness and the learning of languages.


