Enticing aromas drifted from the food tech room as nine boys from years 9 & 10 demonstrated their culinary skills, in reating flavoursome dishes to impress a panel of judges in this the first stage of the annual national cooking competition for 12-16 year olds.

The competition required the boys to produce a hot wholesome main course meal for two people at a cost of under £4. They were to be judged not only on the dish's composition, flavour and taste but the menu balance, their workmanship, creativity and presentation. All nine boys impressed with their skills and understanding of processes and nutrition. Dishes ranged from the tried and tested favourites to some adventurous excursions into flavour and style. Josh Hudson's family recipe for spaghetti Bolognese packed great flavours while the Creaminess and texture

of Jack Panton's risotto was just perfect.

However the competition was not just about the flavours and textures of the dishes but the range of processes and skills demonstrated during the 1 hour cooking period. The two boys that excelled most in both areas were heat winner Andrew Gayler with his "Chick 'n Cheese 'n Chive" dish and runner-up leuan Lavender with his "Stuffed Sweet Chilli Peppers". Andrew will now go forward to represent the school at the Local Finals in November at the Gloucestershire College's Renaissance Restaurant in Cheltenham, We wish him good luck and success.

European Day of Languages



The European Day of Languages provided the school with a wonderful opportunity to showcase the talents of staff and pupils. This was a celebration not of European languages but of the diverse languages spoken within Europe. Pupils from years 7 and 8 had the opportunity to learn basic phrases in a number of different languages - Croatian, Arabic, Hindi, Mandarin Chinese, Japanese, Urdu, Bengali, Dutch, Welsh, Indonesian and Italian were all on offer and it was mostly our own pupils and teachers who provided the expertise.

The Council of Europe declared 26th September as the European Day of Languages in 2001 to promote the learning of foreign languages. Success has followed success and it is now celebrated in 45 countries. The day aims to diversify the range of languages learned in order to increase plurilingualism and intercultural understanding and to promote the rich linguistic and cultural diversity in Europe.

The success of the day was due entirely to the good will and support of the school and local community. It was a pleasure to watch our non-language teaching staff in action and to see the Sixth Form pupils engage so well with younger members of the school. 

The examination students are working hard on their coursework projects. Most of the essential research, development, modelling and planning is completed during this term. This design work is essential, as it will ensure that the manufacturing [which the students start at Christmas] progresses smoothly, and hence the students hopefully gain maximum marks.

The students this year have chosen a broad range of projects, at GCSE we have students designing projects such as jewellery storage and clocks and AS /A2 level we have students designing tables, waste bins and desks. The students are working well and aiming to improve on the very successful results we achieved last year.

IT IS ROCKET TECHNOLOGY



Following disappointment and frustration in trying to get the F1 challenge competition off the ground 2 years ago, the students concerned rather lost interest in year 9. However, faced with either repay your sponsorship or do something, they have decided to do something.

Following some investigation and hands on experience by the technology teacher to check out the safety and feasibility of such a club we are now ready to get under way. We have the makings of a launch pad, although we may have to weld a plate underneath to prevent scorching of Mr William's rugby pitches. The Year 10 group hope to get underway next half term with some rocket constructions, basic set up and testing of small rockets.



Last year's Youth Parliament Elections saw us not only as a polling station but as a focus for the elections with four candidates standing. This was a fantastic experience for the candidates and provided some lively and heated debate and real interest by students. However, it did not make for good political calculation by splitting the vote four ways. For a school already disenfranchised by being a relatively small secondary school this was not good news.

This year we also have four candidates: three from Year 11: Isaac Leaver, Rhys Harben and Edwan Shibli and one from Year 8: Mark Thiselton. This year the candidates have agreed to have an internal run off to select a single candidate for the school. It must be made clear that this does not prevent, and we have no authority to prevent, any student standing as a candidate and of course all students will have a free vote. However, we hope that students will support this idea and seek to select the best school candidate to go forward to the regional elections.

Although a small secondary school, our students demonstrate time and again a commitment to extra-curricula activities and an excellent ability to communicate and organise. They have much to offer to the Youth Parliament and should be applauded and actively supported in their aspirations.

I hope students will be encouraged to get behind these candidates and to play a part in at least registering a vote but also in actively canvassing for the chosen candidate. By the time of printing this article, the candidates will have given their address to interested students in a lunchtime event. They will then have taken part in a lunchtime debate both supervised and chaired by Alexander Petersen from Year 13.

In the week after half term all students will be given an opportunity during tutor time, to vote for the candidate of their choice.

Results will be announced in Year assemblies in the following week and we will then, as a school go on to support and canvass for this student.



TOYOTA CHALLENGE TECHNOLOGY CLUB



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
A LEVEL ART TRIP TO LIVERPOOL

The Art Department once again began the year with its now well-established A Level residential visit. This year it was the turn of Liverpool to provide the location and inspiration for the Year 12 and 13 artists. with a combination of gallery visits and sketching opportunities, followed by evening workshops back at the YHA base. With uncanny timing, Mr. Lockey managed to book the trip for the week before the start of the Liverpool Biennial. thereby missing dozens of events and displays. However, the students were not short of things to see and do. They began with a visit to the Tate Liverpool and did some sketching in and around the Albert Docks area, which gave them a good indication of the range and variety of visual images they would encounter on the trip.

The following day was devoted to visiting the two large and imposing cathedrals, one very traditional in design and the other much more unusual and contemporary looking, even though they were built at very similar times in the last century. This was followed by a visit to the Walker Gallery, which contains a host of British paintings and sculptures spanning several centuries, including some excellent examples of Pre-Raphaelite art.

Thursday's main focus was a trip to Crosby Beach, the location of the internationally famous installation by Anthony Gormley called 'Another Place'. This consists of a hundred cast iron figure sculptures placed at intervals along the

coastline. Although they began as identical figures, the weather and tides have eroded their surfaces so that they are each now unique. The students could have spent several hours investigating and recording them, unfortunately, although it was dry, there was a very strong wind that made it extremely difficult to stand up straight, let alone do any sketching. (We eventually surrendered to the elements and returned to Liverpool to do some shopping instead).



On the last day, we broke our journey back to Gloucester to visit the Lady Lever Gallery in Port Sunlight, which gave the students their last opportunity to do some critical studies research and complete what had been yet another busy but successful start to the A Level Art courses.

Cross Country

Sir Thomas Rich's School's Cross Country season got off to a flying start again this year. The season started with some of the more daring runners taking on the Men's Health Survival of the Fittest run in Cardiff on the 3rd of October. This is the second year now boys from the school have tackled the 12km run with an obstacle course every km. All boys managed to conquer the final hurdle, a ten foot wall on the finish line, exhausted, muddy and wet. Adam Jelley even managed to get himself interviewed by a camera crew for his efforts. Josh Wiltshire had the most success finishing second in his wave of runners with a time of 1:20:46. Apparently, the runner who beat Joshua skipped an obstacle, obviously a man sadly lacking in STRS grit!

Sir Thomas Rich's has seen success also this half term in the ESAA Cross Country Cup. The first round of races were held at Bromsgrove School with eight schools competing. STRS took a junior and in termediate team and both finished overall in second place, securing a position in the next regional round later in the year. The juniors ran particularly well with all boys finishing in the top ten. Chris Tillot finished comfortably in second place with a quick time of 9:57 with Will Staddon making an impressive debut in fifth with a time of 10:04. 
