Iceland 2010

EXAMINATION RESULTS

We are delighted that our students achieved excellent results this summer. Good GCSE results ensured our Year 11s gained firm foundations for progression to Sixth Form study; GCSEs are increasingly used by over-subscribed universities to help to determine their offers. Our students' A-level results enabled almost all to progress to their first-choice universities. Well done to our students and their teachers.

GCSE: every Year 11 boy passed at least eight GCSEs at grade C and above (including English and maths). 61% of passes were at grades A* and A, 90% were at grades A*-B. The average number of passes per student was 10.05. The average points score per student (based on A*=58, A=52, B=46, etc.) was 488.3, equivalent to almost ten grade As per student.

AS: the pass rate was 98%, with 64% at grades A and B. The average points score per student (A=60, B=50, etc.) was 226.5. The commonest grade was A, almost three quarters of Year 12 gained at least one grade A, almost half achieved two or more grade As.

A-Level: this was the first year in which the new grade A* was introduced, which requires a grade A to have been achieved at AS and at least 90% in the A2 exam. Year 13 had 100% pass rate, with 40% at grades A* and A, 75% at grades A*-B. The average number of A-levels passed per student was 3.7; their average points score (A*=140, A=120, B=100, etc.) was 433.

ACADEMY STATUS

We have almost completed the preparatory work required by the Department for Education, to allow them to approve our conversion to academy status. We had hoped this would have occurred on 1st September but the change from 'community school' involves considerable additional work so we are aiming for approval during this month.

I would reassure parents that the change will not affect our students' education in any way other than allowing us to provide additional resources. Academy status will bring with it some additional freedoms, primarily the freedom to spend a greater proportion of our funding allocation, of which 14% is currently retained by the Local Authority. We shall continue to be a Grammar School, we shall retain our three specialisms, and we shall continue our work supporting local schools.

WELCOME TO NEW STAFF

We welcome the following new staff who have joined us this year: Mr. Jobson (Head of Maths), Ms. Shaw (Maths), Mrs. Thomas (French), Ms. Law (English), Mrs. Waterson (Biology), Ms. Francey (Geography), Mr. Windsor and Mr. Faux, who will provide our teaching cover, and Mrs. Bain, School Secretary.

Several staff have gained promotions within school and we wish them well with their new responsibilities: Ms. Brake, Head of our Modern Foreign Languages Faculty (in addition to Head of Year 12); Mr. Johnson, Head of ICT; Mrs. Jones, Head of Performing Arts; Mrs. Banks, Head of Sixth Form General Studies; Mr. Barton, Commercial Operations Manager.

NEW PUPILS

We have one hundred and fifteen boys in Year 7 who join us from 55 different primary schools. Our new Year 12 has one hundred and thirty students of whom 42 join us from 19 other secondary schools. Twenty nine of Year 12 are girls, making a total of 62 girls in our Sixth Form. Total student numbers are 816 (compared with 801 in September 2009).

ABSENCES

If a pupil is absent from school and we have not been informed of the reason, we shall use our *Call Parent* facility to text parents to alert them to the absence. We shall wait until about 10.00 a.m. so that we do not trouble parents for pupils who have arrived late or for whom parents telephone to let us know of an absence. It will obviously help if parents can ensure the School is informed of pupil absence as soon as possible.

A reminder to parents that advising us of an absence in advance does not authorise the absence. Only the Headmaster can grant permission for absence, holidays in term time are never authorised.

REFURBISHMENT

The School has been busy throughout the summer holidays with contractors and our own staff effecting improvements. Most notable is our Dining Area which was cramped and gloomy, it is now spacious, brighter and welcoming. We are indebted to our wonderful Parents' Association for all their efforts which have facilitated this long-overdue development.

Several new interactive whiteboards have been installed, most classrooms now have this invaluable teaching aid. Classrooms and corridors have been cleaned and painted, and tired tables and chairs have been replaced. Our first floor (home to History, Business/ Economics and R.E.) has been refurbished, with new flooring and the removal of old, wooden lockers. The outside has been given a deep-clean and we intend to have hanging baskets to brighten our 1960s building. Our new Food Technology room is progressing, it is due to be completed by the end of term.



END OF TERM

Our final assembly, on the last day of term, was too late to feature in our July Newsletter. We were delighted to welcome Will Porterfield, Chris Dent and Steve Snell, Gloucestershire County Cricket 1st XI players, who helped to present Colours, certificates and cups.

The Cock House Trophy was retained by Westgate, who won 14 of the 23 inter-House competitions through the year, hence were convincing winners from Southgate, Eastgate and Northgate.

SUMMER SHIRT

The school is introducing an optional short sleeved shirt or blouse embroidered with the school crest next year. They can be worn all year, as any other shirt, but during the Summer Term pupils will be allowed to wear them without a tie and blazer. The intention is that it will allow pupils to dress appropriately for the weather throughout the Summer Term, whilst remaining smart and identifiable as Sir Thomas Rich's students. They will be available to all years, including the Sixth Form. There will be an order form which you can be down loaded from the school website. As this is a new item of made-to-order uniform we must have your orders by 17th September to quarantee delivery in time for the Summer Term.

SCHOOL UNIFORM

The school is introducing white short sleeved shirts and blouses embroidered with the school crest as an optional uniform item. These are to be delivered in March 2011 ready for the start of the Summer Term. Order forms were sent home in July to be returned by 17th September 2010.

Due to circumstances beyond our control we had to source a new supplier over the summer. Despite our best efforts we have no alternative but to increase prices by between £1 and £2 per shirt.

Boys' shirts up to 14" collar are now £8.00, larger sizes £10.00. Girls' blouses up to 36" bust are £8.00, larger sizes £10.00. A revised order form/price list has been posted on the school website. If you have already sent in your order and payment—using the old order-form please do not send in any extra money yet – this may be paid when the shirts are collected in March. If you would prefer to cancel your order this is not a problem. Please send a note to the school secretary advising you wish to cancel your order by Tuesday 21st September 2010.

Any new orders should be returned to the School Secretary by 17th September using the revised order-form downloadable from the school website.


Free Time
