The most wickets taken in one match was done by Jim Laker from England, he took 10-53 in one innings and 9-37 in the other. Against Australia.

Which Test playing nation holds the record for the most Test match wins in a row? Australia -Test cricket record for winning most test matches without losing or drawing but winning, anywhere in the world goes to Australia with 16 games. That winning streak was achieved by Aussies between late 1999 to early 2001 under the captainship of Steve Waugh before Indians beat them at Kolkata (after following on, Laxman 281)!

England -v- Australia Test Match Series are called what? The Ashes

The series is named after a <u>satirical obituary</u> published in a British newspaper, <u>The Sporting Times</u>, in 1882 after a match at <u>The Oval</u> in which Australia beat England on an English ground for the first time. The obituary stated that English cricket had died, and the body will be cremated and the ashes taken to Australia. The English media dubbed the next English tour to Australia (1882–83) as the quest to regain The Ashes.
